NEW DELHI, OPEN SEARCH

Disturbances, enrolled in Delhi University, are busy bidding farewell to their famjam at home to head to the Capital, after a hiatus of two years. College campuses are meanwhile prepping to reopen, and in between it's the search for the right accommodation that's on top of the mind of the young brigade. "Finding the right roomie and a comfortable accommodation is what will define the rest of my college life here. I am travelling from Kanpur to Delhi soon. I've got admission in Gargi college, South Campus. I'm seeing PGs in North Campus instead on double sharing basis with my friend. There are two reasons for this. One, my friend's college is in North Campus and two, South Delhi mein, PGs ab available hi nahi rahe. Even though

the distance is coming to be of 1 hour, from my college to my PG, I think I'll manage. Finding affords a accommodation has become a problem in Delhi. And rather than sharing a room with a stranger, I would share it with my friend. Since the news of reopening campus has come, all students have been rushing to make bookings," says Disha Bhatia, a second year student from Gargi College. Facing a similar situation is Vishwas Girder, a second year student of Hansraji College who is looking to relocate to Delhi from Sirsa, Haryana. "Last few months when there were rumours of campus reopening, I had done a cursory search on PG rates. Compared to that, after the news of campus reopening broke out recently, PG rates have risen and like how I think out of panic students

have made advance bookings with token payment of



up to 7-8 thousand which has bloated demand for accommodations," he shares. Confirming the news of an increase in booking calls, PG owners are making sure that new tenants take the rules of Covid safety seri-

ously in their new PGs. "We have been getting calls for in our PG. We encourage our residents to take these Auro Girls PG, Jawahar Nagar, Delhi. Students who will be leaving their homes after two years for the first time, are understandably anxious. "The one thing I make sure of is that in these pandemic times when students are scared, I assure them that they are not coming to a PG they are coming home. We help students during medical emergencies amid the pandemic, we talk to them and take care of them like family would," says Nathuram, owner of University College Hostel, Bungalow Road, Delhi. He adds, "Feeling so nice to see kids coming back to campus. I've been here on campus since 4 years now, providing residential facilities. After the news of reopening broke out, first year students are mostly confused because they don't know yet when their classes.

Delhi's air quality in 'poor' category as temperatures rise

NEW DELHI, OPEN SEARCH

Delhi's air quality was in the "poor" category on Monday morning as the mercury was expected to hover at around 27 degrees Celsius. An Air Quality Index (AQI) of 251 was recorded at 7 am on Monday, compared to 253 on Sunday.

The air quality was likely to worsen in the next 24 hours until wind speeds were expected to pick up from Tuesday. According to the System of Air Quality and Weather Forecasting and Research, the AQI on Sunday degraded from Saturday when it was in the "moderate" category. "Low wind speed is likely on... Monday, leading to reduced ventilation and AQI is expected to worsen to the upper end of the 'poor' or the lower end of the 'very poor' category by Monday." The minimum temperature was expected to rise

to around 9 degrees Celsius, two notches higher than Sunday when the city recorded a maximum of 26.4 degrees Celsius, three degrees above the normal.



The call was subsiding with clear skies in Delhi, which has led to an increase in day temperatures. "The maximum temperature, which was around 21-22 degrees following the last spell of rain, is almost now as high as 27 degrees. It could rise even further in the coming week," said R K Jenamani, a scientist at India's Meteorological Department. "The minimum [temperature] will also be around 9 to 10 degrees next week, making nights also warmer."

Delhi: Woman, stabbed, goes to cops with knife in shoulder

A 27-year-old woman was allegedly assaulted and stabbed multiple times by her husband, while his mother egged him on, in Rohini's Kanjhawala area on Friday. Police said after the man went on the run, the woman walked into a police station to file a complaint with the knife still stuck in her shoulder around 8pm. A team rushed the woman to a hospital where she was treated. A senior police officer said that they registered a case under sections 323 (Punishment for voluntarily causing hurt), 342 (Punishment for wrongful confinement), 324 (Voluntarily causing hurt by dangerous weapons or means) and 34 (Acts done by several persons in furtherance of common intention) of the Indian Penal Code and started investigating the case.

"The man suspect and his mother are currently on the run. We have formed a team to investigate the case and are searching for both of them," the officer said. In her statement, the woman told the police that she had been married to her husband since 2012 and had two children. She alleged that her husband was abusive, and had become even more so after losing his job a couple of months ago. However, she did not complain to the police, because she was worried about her family's reputation. She added that her mother-law stayed with them and added to the discord. As a result, the woman had left her marital home 10 days ago, and only returned to spend some time with her children because they were to celebrate their birthdays on February 10 and 11.

Temperatures may stay above normal in Capital this week : Met

NEW DELHI, OPEN SEARCH

Both day and night temperatures in Delhi are on the rise, and may remain above the normal mark this week, India Meteorological Department (IMD) has said in its forecast.

Safdarjung, Delhi's base station for weather, recorded a maximum of 26.4 degrees Celsius on Sunday - three degrees above normal. This will likely touch 28 degrees by February 18, IMD officials said. Delhi recorded a minimum of 7 degrees Celsius on Sunday - three degrees below normal, however, this too is expected to rise by 2-3 degrees in the next 24 hours, reaching 11 degrees by February 19, according to IMD's seven-day forecast.

"Clear skies are being seen during the day now and this is leading to a rise in daytime temperature. The maximum which was around 21-22 degrees following the last spell of rain, has almost returned to a high of 27 degrees. It could rise even further in the coming week," said R K Jenamani, scientist at IMD.

No mandatory home quarantine for international passengers in Delhi

International travellers arriving in Delhi from Monday will not need to quarantine themselves for seven days or get mandatorily tested at the airport according to the revised guidelines of international arrivals issued by the Union

ministry of health and family welfare on Sunday. According to the new guidelines, the list of "at-risk" countries and mandatory seven-day home quarantine have also been done away with in the wake of significant improvement in the Covid-19 situation. Delhi, on Sunday recorded 804 fresh Covid-19 cases and 12 deaths due to the virus, according to the health bulletin.

Passengers will have to, however, self-monitor their health for 14 days after their arrival and if they show symptoms, they will immediately have to isolate themselves and report the symptoms to their nearest health facility. According to the guidelines, 2% of the passengers in a flight will undergo random testing at the airport on arrival. Such travellers will be identified by the airlines concerned (preferably from different countries) will submit their samples and will be allowed to leave the airport.

Nursery to class 8 students return to school today as physical sessions resume

Schools for students from nursery to class 8 in Delhi will reopen on Monday amid a significant improvement in the overall Covid-19 situation in the national capital. The decision to resume the offline mode of learning was announced by the Delhi government in January. All schools in Delhi were shut in late December last year following the outbreak of the fast-spreading Omicron variant. According to guidelines issued out by the Delhi Disaster Management Authority (DDMA), schools have to ensure regular sanitisation of the premises, thermal scanning, wearing of masks, adequate availability of soaps and hand sanitiser, and staggered lunch breaks among others. School authorities have to also ensure that teachers and other staff members are vaccinated. They are free to decide on the number of students they want to accommodate based on their infrastructure, but have to follow Covid-appropriate behavior at all times. Aparajita Gautam, president of the Delhi Parents Association, said many parents are apprehensive to send their children who are in junior classes as they have not been inoculated. Parents have also demanded that schools should resume their transportation services for students. "I would want to send my child but schools have not started transportation yet and I am scrambling to make other logistic arrangements."

Police arrest man who tried to break open ATM

NEW DELHI, OPEN SEARCH

New Delhi : Police have arrested a man who tried to break open an ATM in southwest Delhi's Uttam Nagar area on Saturday. They said he allegedly used a frying pan and a pair of pliers to try to break it open, but did not succeed. Police identified the accused as one Deepak Ram (21), and said that he received a PCR call regarding the incident in the Green Park Extension area.

"The caller told him he saw a man inside the ATM cabin trying to break the machine to steal cash. He tried to overpower him but during the scuffle, Ram escaped DCP (southwest) Gaurav Sharma said that they immediately registered an FIR and a team scanned footage from at least 250 CCTV cameras in the area. They then ascertained his location caught him after a chase of almost 100 metres.
